Anne Brown ,provided an excellent presentation 'Mrs Broon's Story: A RDA' s Rider's Story'.


Wendy Scott provided an informative talk entitled ' Driving Force' which gave an insight into Carriage Driving to the audience.

## CELEBRATING OUR 50TH YEAR AND LOOKING TO THE FUTURE



Throughout 2019 Riding for the Disabled Association celebrated our 50th Anniversary.

This was rounded off in spectacular fashion by a SUPRA Conference held at Ingliston Country Club and hosted by the West and Central Scotland Region - an honour in itself!

The Conference centered around 'Help Our Horses Help Us' and included talk and demonstrations.

Cathy Burrell, Dressage Coach, informed us on how to match a horse with the right rider; Felicity George , a Horse Behaviourist, gave us lessons on how to read horses emotions and Russel Guire, a Horse Trainer and Biomechanics expert, explained how cutting edge Biomechanics can be applied to horses and ponies.

All of this was perfectly rounded off by Riders of Storm who completed a display before talking through techniques on how to gain a horses trust.

HRH The Princess Royal presented 14 volunteers with long time service awards and a further 5 with Volunteers of the Year awards and Over and Above awards.

It was a great day to celebrate the 50th anniversary but also to recognise the development of the West and Central Region since it started in 1967.

## Argyll RDA Carriage Driving Group

Although the schools have now returned, unfortunately we've not been able to welcome back our young riders yet but our volunteers are working hard to ensure the yard meets all the criteria for our reopening.

Blairgowrie RDA chair Rhona Christie said: "Our fantastic team of volunteers have done a great job of caring for the ponies at our base at Easter Rattray Farm over the last few months and we're very grateful for their support.

"Morven, Erin, Percy and Tony love interacting with the children, who come from across the local area including Coupar Angus, Meigle, Burrelton and Alyth, and we've been working hard over the last few months to keep the four-legged foursome fit and healthy for lessons restarting."



## **Breadalbane & District Group**

We had a very successful season last year with 2 riders passing Grade 3 Riding and Horse Care and everyone passed Grades or was given an Endeavour Award. Our new Shed which was very kindly donated by the League of Friends of Aberfeldy Cottage Hospital is ideal and has been proved to be very dry during the winter. We have one Coach in Training who is hoping to qualify next year.

We were awarded a generous grant from the Region from the Blair Castle Horse Trials for Show-Jumping Equipment and Riding Hats, but this will have to wait until 2021.

We started up again on the 24th of August doing Horse Care to help us adhere to strict social distancing. We had two seven year olds attend, one of whom is unable to stand unaided because of Cerebral Palsy.

We set up two mounting blocks on either side of our pony ,Amy, and Emma was able to stand with support from her mother. Our other pony was 'fenced' in by blocks - both were very happy to be brushed and thoroughly enjoyed their haynets.

We followed, to the letter, all the rules set out. Parents were told to wait in the car until invited in by one of our volunteers. All equipment was ready and both mothers were able to help put this on. While the children waited they were given a talk about grooming kits. Everything was taken home with them and they now arrive dressed and ready each week.

The children were very happy to greet and groom the two very muddy ponies. It was good to see their delight at being 'in touch' again with their ponies.

The able-bodied child was able, with a helper, to lead his pony round the are and came back grinning ear to ear. Gunner, our pony, obeyed verbal commands brilliantly.

Despite the weather making it a rather damp experience it was felt by all to have been a success with protocols managed very well. We aim for our children to achieve Horse Care Grade 2 by the end of the term.



## **Carrick Group**

We are yet to re-start but there have been many positives since last Autumn.

Last October we held a celebration for the 50th anniversary of the founding of the RDA, which included dressage tests and some very competitive games.

The group also had a great Christmas party at Bargower Riding School, which was hugely enjoyed by all those who attended.

It would be remiss not to mention the enormous undertaking that we have just completed. Working hard behind the scenes with arena maintenance and the laying of a new surface at Ayr Equestrian Centre. Our sincere thanks to the Galbraith family of AEC for their unwavering support throughout the project and over the last thirty years.

## **EQUI-POWER CENTRAL SCOTLAND GROUP**

It has been a successful year for Equi-Power.

Our vaulting coach Lynne Blore landed two awards at the Horse Scotland event in early March - Participant and Young Person's coach.

Fifteen participants benefited from online learning with coaches from the 21st of March this year, along with online fun vaulting practice activities. Learning online included RDA levels 1 to 3 and some BHS Challenge awards as well as craft activities.

During lockdown three participants engaged in 'mind-coaching' with Jane Bridley thanks to the funding from the Region's Blair pot. Some funding was also used for coach development sessions to support the mental health of participants, we are working on developing resources that our coaches and participants can use to manage anxiety.

A phased return to services with horses began on Saturday the 15th of August and participants unable to ride will benefit from horse care practicals and Equine Facilitated Learning.

Julie- Anne was invited to provide training in Equine Facilitated Learning for Edinburgh and Borders RDA, a recording of this session will be made available.

Julie-Anne is also in discussions with RDA UK about supporting the inclusion of safe ground work activities within RDA insurance. A very important part of this process is the inclusion of questions around mental health and behaviour on participant and volunteer application forms and having trained specialists on a panel that approves applications and signposts to appropriate levels of support for both physical and psychological safety for all parties.

Equi-Power walkers successfully completed the Kilt Walk surpassing their target of ten thousand pounds. Walkers strutted their stuff on the West Highland Way, London and Stirling with the walk ending at Kildean, the site for our new facilities. The walk was coordinated by SOGB Athlete Ambassador Lyn Dumbleton and her Mum. Thanks to a tip off from Mary Dunlop, Equi-Power was gifted a four berth caravan and awning, along with a 12 man tent from a generous gentlemam in Perth - we foresee this being very useful moving forward.





## Forth Driving

Last September we had the honour of welcoming HRH The Princess Royal who was treated to a demonstration from Linda Farquhar and Ann Cameron who drove Ozzy and Splash. Both the ponies were presented with Long Service Awards.

The RDA' s 50th Anniversary was a great excuse to celebrate with friends, cake and a driving course. It was enjoyed by all those that attended.

November saw the Glasgow Group win the British Horse Society Approvals Centre award for 'the facility which has made the greatest difference to the community'.


Our Tulliallen Trail was reinstated and refurbished with help from our Corporate Groups and our office received a makeover with some lovely furniture donated by BAM Properties.

#### **MULL**


